I - INTRODUCTION

COMMUNITY CONTINGENCY PLAN

Eastern Charlotte Waterway's developed this Community Contingency Plan under the direction of The Community Action Partnership Program (CAPP).

This Plan was developed not only for oil spill response, but also for all environmental or emergency responses.

In case of any such emergencies, please contact The Canadian Coast Guard Operation Centre at **1-800-565-1633**. They will receive your calls 24 hours a day and notify the appropriate Government agency.

.(Gasoline and chemical spills should also be reported to your local fire department.)

II Purpose

- * To provide basic direction to the community in the event of an oil spill or environmental emergency.
- * Identifies community resources available to the community and to incoming responders.
- * Provides a constant approach to contingency planning at the community level.
- * To assist in the definition of interface, roles, and responsibilities between federal, provincial, and municipal officials.
- * The components of this plan are contained in the table of contents.

III NOTIFICATION

ENVIRONMENTAL EMERGENCY NUMBER

IN THE EVENT OF AN OIL SPILL OR AN ENVIRONMENTAL EMERGENCY, PLEASE CALL - 1-800-565-1633 (24 HOURS).

Your contact will be the Canadian Coast Guard Operations Centre, who will notify the appropriate government agencies.

When reporting an incident to the operations centre, callers should give their name (optional), telephone number, and time the spill or environmental emergency was sighted.

HERE ARE A FEW IMPORTANT THINGS YOU SHOULD TRY TO NOTE WHEN YOU REPORT A SPILL OR AN EMERGENCY:

1. What is spilled, how much, and where it is located?
2. Is the spill on land, in the water, and is it moving?
3. Do you know the source of the spill?
4. Is the spill an immediate threat to public safety?
5. What type of environmental emergency is it?
6. What the extent of the damage is.

(GASOLINE SPILLS SHOULD ALSO BE REPORTED TO THE LOCAL FIRE DEPARTMENT)

EVEN IF YOU DO NOT KNOW THE ANSWERS TO ALL OF THE QUESTIONS DO NOT WAIT. CALL 1-800-565-1633 SO A RESPONSE CAN BEGIN.

IV COMMUNITIES ROLE

GENERAL

The community will identify local resources and sensitivity information.

The community will also maintain and update the community contingency plan with the assistance of Canadian Coast Guard and various organizations.

The community will work with the responding agencies to determine the definition of interface, roles and responsibilities.

V LEVELS OF RESPONSIBILITIES

A) POLLUTER (RESPONSIBLE PARTY)

The polluter (**responsible party**) has the first responsibility for initiating effective action to counteract an environmental emergency. The polluter also has financial responsibility for damage and cleanup costs incurred as a result spill or environmental emergency.

The responsibility is subject to any liability arrangements or limitations provided by statute or court decisions, or by international conventions in force and ratified by Canada at the time of the incident. If the polluter chooses not to initiate cleanup actions or if the situation is of such magnitude that the polluter is unable to respond adequately, or if the polluters response is inappropriate, ineffective, or unsafe than the Coast Guard will appoint an on - scene commander and assume command and control of the situation.

B) CANADIAN COAST GUARD

THE CANADIAN COAST GUARD HAS THE LEAD ROLE IN RESPONDING TO THOSE MARINE EMERGENCIES WHEN:

- 1.) Department of Fisheries & Oceans, by legislation, regulation, interagency agreement and precedent, has been authorized.**
- 2.) Assignment of authority has not been established but the Federal Government instructs the Department of Fisheries & Oceans, because of its authorities, marine expertise and resources, to lead the response.**

The Canadian Coast Guard is responsible to investigate and act as lead agency for spills originating from vessels within "waters of Canadian interest", under it's jurisdiction. In these cases, the CCG is responsible to ensure that the vessel owner complies with the Canada Shipping Act (CSR) and accepts responsibility for cleanup. The Canadian Coast Guard is also responsible for mystery spills.

C) DEPARTMENT OF FISHERIES & OCEANS

The Department of Fisheries & Oceans is responsible for managing and providing information and advice regarding fisheries resource and their habitats, as well as scientific advice in relation to fish. Also, they have a major responsibility under the fish inspection act to ensure the contaminated product does not enter the market and that the public health is protected.

D) ENVIRONMENT CANADA

Environment Canada, Environmental Protection Branch (EPB), leads the investigation of spills originating from Federal facilities and Federal vessels. EPB also has shared responsibilities with Fisheries & Oceans for spills impacting waters frequented by fish, under the Canadian Fisheries Act and the Canadian Environmental Protection Act.

EPB is responsible for ensuring that regional mechanisms are in place for timely and effective environmental emergency response efforts. To this end, the Regional Environmental Emergencies Team (REET) has been organized to provide consolidated, coordinated and comprehensive environmental information and advice concerning environmental impacts, resource sensitivities, environmental forecasting, contingency planning, cleanup techniques and priorities, and a host of other matters which arise while planning and responding to emergency events which affect or risk environmental quality.

While REET is chaired by Environment Canada, EPB, it includes a large number of Federal and Provincial agencies which have expertise, information and responsibilities/authority relevant to environmental emergencies and environmental protection. Private industry and industry associations also participate in REET as they have significant interest in emergency response. Coastal communities will link into the REET process through the regional Community Action Partnership Program (CAPP) coordinator.

E) OFFICE OF CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE, PROTECTION & EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS (OC�PEP)

This agency has the mandate to advance civil preparedness in Canada for emergencies of all types... by facilitating and coordinating among Federal institutions and in cooperation with Provincial Governments, Foreign Governments and International Organizations, the development and implementation of civil emergency plans.

F) NATURAL RESOURCE CANADA (NRCAN)

In the maritime region, EMR maintains the Atlantic Geoscience Centre to provide scientific advice in the area of coastal geomorphology, to determine the impact of cleanup methods on beaches and to conduct research aimed at better understanding beach process throughout Atlantic Canada. Atlantic Geoscience Centre can also provide technical advice on chemical and toxic substances and their interaction with coastal and marine sediment, and shoreline video coverage.

G) CANADA-NOVA SCOTIA OFFSHORE PETROLEUM BOARD

Under the Canada-Nova Scotia accord implementation act, CNSOPB is responsible for environmental as well as health and safety matters associated with oil and gas activity. CNSOPB is the lead agency for response to spills associated with exploration and production activity in their area.

H) PROVINCIAL EMERGENCY MEASURES ORGANIZATIONS (NB, NS, PEI)

Provincial emergency measures organizations are lead agencies for incidents where public safety is the prime concern and can provide assistance to other lead agencies as required (e.g. evacuation, search and rescue, surveillance).

I) TRANSPORT CANADA - TRANSPORT OF DANGEROUS GOODS

Transport of Dangerous Goods inspectors are responsible for the enforcement of the transportation of dangerous goods regulations as they apply to land, water and air transport. TDG maintains a 24-hour national response centre called **CANUTEC**, and provides investigations during transport emergencies involving chemicals and other dangerous goods.

CANUTEC is the Canadian Transport Emergency Centre. It is located in Ottawa and is operated by the Transport of Dangerous Goods directorate of Transport Canada. In an emergency, **CANUTEC may be called collect at (613) 996-6666 (24 hrs).**

CANUTEC provides a national bilingual advisory service and is staffed by professional chemists. Experienced and trained in interpreting technical information and providing emergency response advice when CANUTEC receives an emergency call. The emergency response advisor obtains relevant information about the emergency and recommends the appropriate response actions for the protection of the public and for the stabilization and containment of the dangerous goods involved.

J) ROYAL CANADIAN MOUNTED POLICE (RCMP)

The RCMP responsibilities at the accident site are for traffic and crowd control, dealing with casualties, explosives disposal, bomb threats, evacuations and investigation of criminal matters. By virtue of being first on the scene, the RCMP may also be obligated to handle initial spill containment.

K) CANADIAN HERITAGE, PARKS CANADA

Parks Canada operates and maintains a significant number of national parks and heritage sites in the Atlantic Region. All the national parks have contingency plans to respond to environmental emergencies under their jurisdiction. Emergency section of EC liaise closely with Parks Canada staff during large incidents to share response resources and minimize the environmental impacts.

L) PROVINCIAL DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENT(NS, NB, PEI)

The Provincial Department of Environment acts as lead agency for spills that fall under Provincial jurisdiction and are responsible for the designation of disposal sites and disposal procedures. In addition, is a resource agency for human resources, surveillance, cleanup and environmental advice and where appropriate, soliciting input from other provincial government agencies such as fisheries, health, mines and energy. The Provincial Environment Departments investigate spills originating from land-based source or sewers or spills affecting potable water supplies.

VI RESPONSE ORGANIZATION ROLES

A) GENERAL

The response organizations have been created to ensure that a capability exists to deal with oil spills in the Canadian Marine Environment. Every bulk oil tanker over 150 gross tones, every dry cargo vessel over 400 gross tonnes, and all designated Oil Handling Facilities (OHF's) are required by the Canadian Shipping Act to have an arrangement with a certified response organization. The entire above is referred to as "clients" by the response organization.

The response organization may respond to a client's request for assistance in the event their property is involved in an oil spill. The response organization may provide operational management for the client who is the "responsible party" in the event of a spill.

OPERATION MANAGEMENT INCLUDES:

LOGISTICS: the procurement of resources to support the operation.

PLANNING: the identification of sensitivities, shoreline impact assessment, prioritization of activities, waste disposal coordination, application of cleanup techniques, health and safety plan development, and documentation.

OPERATIONS: the application of the procured resources.

FINANCE: payment of costs incurred by the response organization and invoicing for services rendered.

THESE DEFINITIONS ARE RESPONSE ORGANIZATION DOCTRINE.

The response organization is not responsible for the effects of an oil spill. This remains with the polluter. Command and control of all activities remains with the polluter. In the event the polluter does not except this role, the Canadian Coast Guard assumes "command and control" of the incident and the response the Canadian Coast Guard may hire organization.

The response organization will also plan for the protection of the identified sensitivities prior to oil spills occurring in its geographic area of response, and will work with communities to this end.

IX Environmentally Significant Areas

Areas of environmental significance along the mainland coastal region are each diverse and unique in their recognized qualities.

This is a list of the Environmentally Significant Areas from Black River to Martin Head.

1) Powers Beach

45° 16' N 65°48' W

Powers Beach is a mixture of sand and gravel, with inter-tidal algae covered cobbles, boulders on a rock ledge platform.

Powers Point to the east of the beach is composed of volcanic and in-differentiated acidic intrusive rocks with minor sandstone, conglomerate and shale.

2) McLeod's Beach

45° 16' N 65°48' W

McLeod's Beach is a beautiful sand/gravel beach. Emerson Creek, which flows out on the most easterly portion of the beach extends back behind the dune barrier and beneath the road into a small salt marsh.

3) Reeds Beech

45° 16' N 65°46' W

Reeds Beach is a small pocket beach consisting mainly of sand and gravel, with low bedrock cliffs of reddish brown conglomerate, sandstone and siltstone to the east and west.

4) Gardner Creek Beach

45° 17' N 65°43' W

Gardner Creek Beach is mainly gravel and inter-tidal rocks to the west, and is mainly sand towards the east. There are quite a few small sandy pocket beaches below the cliffs just to the west of split rock, with an algae covered rock ledge platform. Many interesting tidal pools form in this area at low tide.

Duck pond sits behind the eastern part of the beach. The amount of fresh/salt water interchange at low and high tide varies from year to year due to the storm berm shifting.

Split rock is a highly photographed geological formation. It consists of red conglomerate, sandstone and shale locally with associated basalts.

5) Robinson Cove

45°17' N 65°41' W

This cove sits between split rock and East Head. There is a small sandy beach, with high bedrock cliffs of Triassic red conglomerate sandstone to the east and west.

6) Tynemouth Creek

45°18' N 65°40' W

A natural breakwater exists at the mouth of the creek with berm material consisting of rock, sand and gravel. Inter-tidal substrate material consists of sand and mud. The tidal salt marsh and creek extends fairly far back inland, and is an important feeding ground for migrating birds.

7) Giffin Pond

45° 19' N 65° 35' W

A freshwater pond separated from the bay by a gravel bar. At high tides the saltwater used to pass over the bar affecting the aquatic life, but the tide itself has recently closed this channel off. Only a small amount of salt water seeps through the cobblestone and gravel bar.

A cobblestone beach separates the pond from the ocean. The steep cliffs to the east of the pond are composed mainly of red conglomerate sandstone and shale. Accumulations of sediment, eroded from the cliff face by weathering, have buried the lower section of the cliff in some places. Sediment collects at base of cliffs. There are two pocket beaches to the east of the main beach, which are accessible by foot at low tide.

8) Browns Beach

45°19' N 65°33' W

Browns Beach is a gravel beach. Berm material is a mixture of sand and gravel. There are, however, large inter-tidal sand flats and rocky outcrops at the extreme edges of the beach. Large numbers of Sea ducks can be seen on most occasions.

To the west of the main beach, there is a smaller gravel pocket beach with inter-tidal rock outcrops.

To the east of the main beach, are vertical cliffs composed of reddish brown conglomerate sandstone and siltstone, along with inter-tidal rocky outcrops covered in algae. This is a fairly well protected cove where various species of sea ducks can be observed nesting and feeding.

9) Quaco Head

45°19' N 65°32' W

Vertical cliffs surround Quaco Head consisting of reddish brown conglomerate sandstone and siltstone, but some beach is accessible at low tide.

10) St. Martins Beach

45°20' N 65°33' W

St. Martins Beach consists mainly of sand and gravel. There is a large inter-tidal marsh behind the beach, with channels and pools that fill at high tide. Quaco River runs out at the most westerly end of the beach. Many different types of birds may be seen nesting or feeding here at various times of the year.

11) Mac's Beach

45°21' N 65°32' W

Mac's Beach is a gravel-cobblestone beach, but sand does build up in the caves that have been carved out of the red conglomerate sandstone by the tides. Tourists frequent this beach heavily during the summer season.

12) Echo Cove

45°22' N 65°31' W

Echo Cove is a very unique and interesting combination of Triassic Period red conglomerate sandstone sheer rock faces with sandy beach and a sandy/mudflat at low tide. A few small caves have also been carved out into the sandstone.

13) Berry Beach

45°22' N 65°30' W

Berry beach is a pebble beach with a fairly large berm composed of pebbles and cobbles.

Behind the berm there is a small marshland area, and Berry brook, which flows out through the western side of the beach at low tide.

To the east of the beach, are high vertical cliffs and an inter-tidal platform with pebbles and cobbles. The cliffs are mainly reddish brown conglomerate sandstone and siltstone, susceptible to erosion.

14) Fowne's Beach

45°22' N 65°28' W

Fowne's beach is a smaller pebble beach, with a small brook running out through the beach.

To the east of the beach there are sharp vertical cliffs and an inter-tidal platform, with a few caves, and large cracks that extend into the rock forming caves. These caves are only accessible at low tide by foot.

To the west of the beach there are a large number of inter-tidal rocky outcrops covered in algae, various sized tidal pools, and high cliffs that are susceptible to erosion. Large pieces of rock have fallen to the base of the cliff.

15) Melvin Beach

45°23' N 65°27' W

Melvin Beach is a fairly extensive beach consisting of large cobbles. High cliffs of reddish brown conglomerate rise above to the Fundy Trail Parkway. Fuller Brook runs out onto the western end of the beach.

16) Big Salmon River

45°25' N 65°24' W

Before lumbering operations began, Big Salmon River was abundant in Atlantic salmon.

Stocking programs and fish ladders later allowed spawning, but present population fluctuates widely.

The beach at the mouth of the river tends to be a debris accumulation area.

17) Long Beach

45°26' N 65°23' W

Long Beach is the result of a glaciofluvial outwash plain, which is gullied and dissected.

The beach consists mainly of sand and gravel, but there is a very extensive sand/mud flat the entire length of the beach.

Long Beach brook flows out into the ocean on the most eastern end of the beach. The western end of the beach is covered by a varied assortment of boulders.

18) Tufts Point

45°26' N 65°22' W

Tufts Point at the eastern end of Long Beach is presently under heavy erosion. A large stand of yellow birch has essentially been lost as the gravel/sand is quickly eroding.

19) Seely Beach

45°27' N 65°21' W

At Seely Brook there is a 5-6 acre stand of red spruce over 200 years old. Seely Beach is composed of mainly sand and gravel. At low tide sandy mudflats can be seen.

20) Little Salmon River

45°29' N 65°17' W

Little Salmon River Gorge area is recognized as an environmentally significant area under DOE's ESA listing and has been identified as a critical natural area in the 1988 publication, "Critical Natural Areas of N.B. "A deep gorge is cut into bedrock by the river, and gravel beds exist beside the river. This gorge is the habitat of several unusual plants: Yellow Bartonnia, Tufted club brush, and Fir club moss.

Interesting geological formations can be seen in the gorge where landslides have occurred.

Mudflats and sand flats exist on both sides, and at the mouth of the river at low tide.

21) Martin Head

45°30' N 65°11' W

Although privately owned, it is a popular site for local residents who often set up motor homes right on the beach. The salt marsh at Martin Head is a critical feeding ground for migratory bird species where Quiddy River runs out onto the western end of the sandy beach.

At low tide, the river can be crossed so that the long sand/gravel bar to Martin Head can be reached. Martin Head is also the site of the following rare plants: Rock-cress *Draba*, and Glaucous Meadow grass.
