Constitutional Law in Criminal Justice (CJ 3352) [LW011B]	3.00
Constitutional provisions which are relevant to criminal law and procedure, their construction and development through court interpretation, and their application in criminal proceedings. {DANTES Code = 12.03.02}	
Introduction to Social Scientific Inquiry (CJ 3375)	3.00
Principles of pure and applied research for the social sciences. Special emphasis is given to the types of research methods employed by social scientists including survey techniques, field research, quasi-experimental designs and analytical procedures currently used in the social sciences.	
Senior Seminar in Criminal Justice (CJ 4499) [CJ127B]	3.00
This is a capstone course designed to (1) help seniors integrate the knowledge gained from their other required criminal justice courses, (2) assist them in developing analytical thinking skills through focusing on selected topics using a seminar approach, and (3) support them in gaining a better understanding of the criminal justice profession and the role they may play in it.

Troy University (TU) General Information

This degree is available online. Troy University / University College is responsible for the delivery of off-campus, out-of-state educational programs. The college is comprised of five geographic regions with approximately 50 branches and teaching sites located in five countries and 14 states. The branches and sites are primarily based on or near military installations and serve military and civilian personnel and their dependents stationed on the bases. The college is a member of the Servicemembers' Opportunity College (SOC) and the Council for Adult and Experiential learning (CAEL).

The maximum amount of college level testing credit accepted by TROY is 30 semester hours for an Associates Degree or 60 semester hours for a Bachelor's Degree. (Note: TROY does not accept Excelsior College Examinations.)

One-time Application Fee: \$30

Tuition per course: \$163 per semester hour (subject to change)

Employees of government agencies, corporations, and private business may be eligible for military tuition rates if they are members of any of the seven Military Reserve or National Guard components. Check with the admissions office to determine eligibility if applicable.

POLICY NOTES:

Transfer of non-traditional credit accepted by TU may include up to 60 semester hours for a Bachelor's Degree (Military credit or college level testing). The remaining 60 semester hours for a Bachelor's Degree must be taken through a four year college or university. Note: 30 semester hours for a Bachelor's Degree must be taken through TU, including 12 semester hours in the concentration.
