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## SPOTLIGHTING The Reserve Directors

Commander Hay grew up in Salem, Mass., and became acquainted with the Coast Guard early in life by spending his summer vacations while he was in grammar school at Baker's Island Lighthouse Station in Salem Harbor. He graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md., in 1934.

CDR Hay prepared for his future active duty in the Coast Guard by making a world cruise in 1926 aboard William K Vanderbilt's yacht, AKA, as quartermaster, and during the boat division of American Car and Foundry Company, makers of A.C.F. cruisers, at the repair yard, City Island, N.Y.

In August 1941 CDR Hay came on active duty as a lieutenant (jg) and reported aboard the USCGC DUANE on which he served as navigator, 1st lieutenant, and finally as gunnery officer. On detachment he went to the Submarine Chaser Training Center in Miami in 1943. Following this training he was assigned as executive officer of the USS PETERSON (DE-152) and a year later he became commanding officer and was decommissioned in May of 1946.

The following month CDR Hay was released to inactive duty.

Prior to his recall to active duty in 1950 to serve on the Reserve Officers' Precedence Board, CDR Hay was commanding officer of the VTU in Boston.

During CDR Hay's second tour of active duty he served as executive officer of the DUANE, and commanding officer of the DEXTER and SEBAGO.

He was assigned as Assistant Director of the Reserve in the 9th District from 1954 to 1958, at which time he assumed his present billet as Reserve Director of the 13th District.

Among CDR Hay's awards for gallant action during World War II are the following three letters of commendation:

Navy Letter of Commendation with Metal Pendant for action with submarine during North Atlantic duty.

Navy Letter of Commendation for service as commanding officer of escort vessel on North Atlantic duty.

## Yorktown Is Acquired As Training Center

The first Reserve summer training course to be held at the new Coast Guard training facility at Yorktown, Virginia, will be the 1959 East Coast Direct Commission School, originally scheduled to be held at the Academy. Three classes of 50 each will convene at Yorktown on 5 July, 19 July and 4 August.

Although the first use of the facility will be by the Officer Candidate School and the indoctrination course for Merchant Marine officers, future plans call for its development as a permanent training base for reservists. The summer of 1959 will see the three direct commission classes and one or two small unit training programs at Yorktown, but as needed additional renovation is undertaken, it is planned to send a considerable number of reservists here for annual training instead of scattering them in many separate installations.

A most unusual award earned by CDR Hay was the Order of the Patriotic War, Second Class, bestowed by the Russian Government. This and other similar awards and medals were awarded to men of the U. S. Navy and Coast Guard for their work on the Murmansk run.

# Code of Conduct

## For Members of the Armed Forces of the United States

I am an American fighting man. I serve in the forces which guard my country and our way of life. I am prepared to give my life in their defense.

I will never surrender of my own free will. If in command I will never surrender my men while they still have the means to resist.

If I am captured I will resist by all means available. I will make every effort to escape and aid others to escape. I will accept neither parole, nor special favors from the enemy.

If I become a prisoner of war, I will keep faith with my fellow prisoners. I will give no information or take part in any action which might be harmful to my comrades. If I am senior, I will take command. If not, I will obey the lawful orders of those appointed over me and will back them up in every way.

When questioned, should I become a prisoner of war, I am bound to give only name, rank, service number and date of birth. I will evade answering further questions to the utmost of my ability. I will make no oral or written statements disloyal to my country and its allies or harmful to their cause.

I will never forget that I am an American fighting man, responsible for my actions, and dedicated to the principles which made my country free. I will trust in my God and in the United States of America.

## Diversion--Not Amusement

When the Santa Rosa and the Valchem collided last March, reservists on training duty aboard the CGD Unimak received an extra measure of impromptu training and valuable experience--on the 26th at about 0500 their cutter was diverted from her Groton destination and ordered to render assistance.

The message from Cape May dispatched the Unimak from a point 20 miles south of Montauk to an area

25 miles east of Atlantic City. Arriving shortly after noon, the WAVES Captain, LCDR E. B. Henry, took charge of operations at the scene. While the CGC Yeaton was escorting the passenger ship Santa Rosa toward New York, two 83-footers were directed to search for missing bodies from the tanker Valchem. The Yeaton also participated in the search.

Advised by the liner that no further aid was necessary. At 1500, the Cynthia Moran commenced towing the Valchem to New York, escorted by the Unimak. Later, the Yeaton's search was interrupted long enough to transfer hot food from the Unimak to the Valchem.

It was 0615 the following morning at the New York harbor entrance before the Unimak could return to her original itinerary, at which time the Tuckahoe assumed escort responsibilities. Thus, within little more than 24 hours, reservists witnessed or performed duties involving the answering of a distress call at full speed, the execution of search patterns, the transfer of rations to survivors, and the escorting of a stricken vessel at 6 knots--an unusual variety of operations rarely simulated for training purposes.

## 1st Post-World War II Spar Called to Active Duty

On 10 March 1959, Angeline TESCH, YN3, reported to the Commander, 9th Coast Guard District, for extended active duty. TESCH is the first SPAR enlisted after World War II to be called to active duty. She enlisted in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, on 2 March 1956, and was immediately assigned to ORTUPS 09-668. She received her two weeks "boot" training with the WAVES at Bainbridge during the summer of 1956. In 1957 she performed her active duty for training at Headquarters, as a member of the group participating in the Armed Forces Day activities, and in 1958 spent two weeks in the office of the Director of the Reserve in Cleveland. Prior to reporting for active duty, TESCH was employed as a clerk in a Milwaukee insurance company.

## First ORTUEL Holds Open House



The Coast Guard must be able to determine what is under the water as well as what is on the surface in order to avoid reefs and other hazards in uncharted waters, as well as to detect, in time of war, the presence of enemy submarines. The Sonarman is the eye and ear of the ship for this purpose.

### Duties and Responsibilities

Sonarmen operate electronic underwater sound equipment to detect the presence, direction and range of various submerged objects. They use listening devices to detect sounds made by propellers or engines of ships or submarines in the vicinity and they distinguish and interpret the reflected sound waves by the indicators.

Sonarmen report their observations to the officer-in-charge so that an effective attack can be made or underwater objects avoided. They perform routine maintenance on equipment and occasionally transmit underwater messages, using International Morse Code.

### Qualifications and Preparation

In the course of their training and experience, sonarmen will be expected to develop the knowledge and skills involved in the theory, operation and function of sonar equipment used aboard ship and at harbor stations; fundamental principles of navigation and piloting including use of charts, dead reckoning, radar, sonar and gyro systems; elementary principles of electricity and magnetism including basic electrical units and their simple manipulation by means of Ohm's law; theory construction and uses of common types of vacuum tubes and techniques of plotting target ranges and bearings and determination of areas to search for contacts.

ORTUEL 01-541, Boston, the first such unit to be commissioned, held an open house recently to introduce its new program of electronics training. This unit, commanded by Lieutenant Commander James D. Larkin, USN, is the first in the Armed Forces to use the 18-month "Photo-sound" method developed by the Electronic Technical Institute of Inglewood, California for training electronics technicians. Under the new program, Coast Guard Reservists are issued textbooks, a phonograph, audio-records of theory and home training devices. With this equipment the reservist studies at

home a required number of hours each week. Once a week, at his regular drill-meeting, the reservist is examined on subject matter studied at home. Examination papers are submitted to the Electronic Technical Institute for grading. Drill books are also used for practical application of course material. Reservists completing the course will be rated as Electronic Technicians 1st class. Executive Officer of the Boston unit is Lieutenant Leon A. Murphy, USCGR. Training Officer is Lieutenant Edmund L. Perry, USCGR.

## Fire Fighting School to Return to U. of Maryland

Again this year, as in 1957, a Port Security Fire Fighting and Fire Prevention School for 60 officers will be conducted during the month of July at the University of Maryland, College Park, Md.

The two scheduled classes, each with a quota of 30 officers, will convene on 5 July and 19 July. Quotas are 4 each for the 2nd, 5th, 7th, 8th and 9th districts and 5 each for the 1st and 3rd. Each district may substitute in each class one qualified chief or first class petty officer in

lieu of a commissioned officer. Officers in Port Security units who are actually training in Port Security subjects are eligible provided they have not already received previous extensive training or are not employed with fire departments.

The curriculum will be similar to those offered during 1957 and 1958 but with amendments and revisions based on needs demonstrated through operation of the program during previous years.

Berthing facilities for students will be provided on the University campus, and messing facilities will be available at a modest cost in the school cafeteria.

## New Marine Safety Program Approved

Because of the continuing need for ready Reserve officers in the field of Merchant Marine Safety, a new program has been approved for the formation of Volunteer Reserve Training Units in Marine Safety. Officers holding any of the following designators are particularly desired for this program: 11, 20, 23, 25, 27, 30 through 35, 91. However, those holding other designators will be considered. A unit has already been established in Boston, one is in process in New York, and it is expected that additional units will be established as soon as sufficient prospective members are located in other areas.

In order to provide study material for these units, a course of instruction is now being developed covering the fields of hull inspection, boiler inspection, and investigation. Tentative plans anticipate a two-year course in which 72 reading assignments, 72 drills, and 4 weeks of active duty training will dovetail to produce officers with the desired qualifications. The actual details of lesson outlines, materials and policies are being prepared and reviewed by appropriate Headquarters authorities at a rate commensurate with the complexities involved. Further information will be disseminated to the field as rapidly as it becomes available.

### Errors in Correspondence Course Applications Noted

Recently applications have been received for officer correspondence courses on forms which have been obsolete for a matter of years. All requests for courses issued by the Naval Correspondence Course Center should be forwarded by the District Commander (dcr) direct to the Center and need not be forwarded via the Commandant. The only exception is for applicants living outside the United States whose records are maintained by the Commandant. Officer correspondence courses should be requested on NAVPERS 992 dated 2-56 or later. All 992's dated earlier than this should be destroyed. Requests for enlisted correspondence courses should be forwarded in the same way, on NAVPERS 580. See your RESERVIST for January, February and March for information on how and where to apply!

With the acquisition of Yorktown, the Coast Guard has obtained vitally needed additional training facilities. Although not all of the buildings are directly suitable for immediate use,

there are included an administration building, classrooms, shops, barracks, officers' quarters, a disposal plant and fire station.

The training center is in the heart of the historic part of Virginia, right off the battlefield on the south bank of the York River. It is about a mile from the center of Yorktown, and less than ten miles from Williamsburg. By car it is less than four hours from Washington and an hour from Norfolk. It is served by the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad and major bus lines, and is accessible by air through the Patrick Henry Airport at Newport News.

## Highlights of Board Noted

Following are highlights from the recommendations of the Reserve Policy Board which met in early December. Results of these recommendations may not be immediately apparent, but plans are under way and as each develops information will be furnished.

- Card type mobilization orders. These are currently under study by the Reserve Division.
- Establishment of Reserve Training Stations. See article on Yorktown, page 1.
- Reserve Officer Examinations and Promotions. Action will be taken following completion of the study by the Ad Hoc Board.
- ID Cards for reservists. Coast Guard to join with other services in urging desirable changes.
- Redesignation of a percentage of ORTU's to operational units.
- Pay breakdown for reservists. Suitable procedures are under study.
- Assignment of numerical designators to SN and FN to facilitate AGDUTRA assignments and mobilization placement.
- Uniform allowances for CPO's--a forthcoming directive will authorize certain additional allowances.

## SPAR Recruit Training Dates Announced

The Coast Guard has been assigned a quota of 5 for each of the WAVE Reserve Recruit training classes convening this summer at the Naval Training Center, Bainbridge, Maryland. Classes will convene on 19 July, 16 August, and 13 September 1959. SPARS who have never completed Navy or Coast Guard recruit training will be required to take this training and should submit Form 3453, Application for Active Duty for Training, at an early date. While the 11th, 12th and 13th Districts are not excluded from this training, requests from these Districts will be considered on the basis of available funds, and there is no assurance that approval will be granted. This requirement is waived for Women Reservists in the 14th and 17th districts, and for those in 11th, 12th and 13th whose requests are not approved.

# Driver Fatigue

**DID YOU KNOW THAT:** Military personnel are involved in 8.5% of all accidents! Military personnel are involved in 11.3% of all fatal accidents! 41.5% of all military accidents occur between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m., and 41.5% of the military fatalities occur between 11 p.m. and 4 a.m.! The early morning hours 2 a.m. to 5 a.m. are the most dangerous! The overall night-time percentages of the military group are largely due to early morning expirations of liberties and the men driving too far and too fast in order to check in on time.

These facts listed in SAFETY REVIEW were gathered from statistics from one state. However, they are typical. Indoctrination of personnel, pointing out the principal causes of fatalities to off-duty military drivers, may help to bring those statistics down. One of the major causes is driver fatigue. Some servicemen overestimate their physical stamina by trying to stretch a 3-day pass into a cross country trip. Many hours behind the wheel without sufficient rest steps lead to "driver hypnosis" the first sign of fatigue. A short nap or a coffee break will help a driver keep awake at the best method for avoiding fatigue is not to travel too long at any one time. Planning the trip in advance will enable the driver to allow for rest stops and it will not be necessary to keep going while sleepy in order to get to a destination.

# Notify Your Commander of Change of Address

Whenever you move or change your mailing address, you are required to notify the holder of your official Coast Guard records of your new address.

Report address changes as follows:

- (a) If not a member of a unit: direct to the district commander holding your records.
- (b) If affiliated with a unit: to the district commander via the commanding officer of your unit.
- (c) If an officer on Inactive Status List: to the Commandant (PR), U. S. Coast Guard, Washington 25, D. C.

A temporary change of residence does not require a transfer of records. However, if you have a temporary residence but mail cannot be delivered promptly, you should notify the holder of your records of your address at the beginning and end of your temporary residence.

Each officer eligible for consideration for temporary or permanent appointment may forward a written communication through official channels regarding any phase of his military record which he considers important to his qualifications for promotion. Such communication, however, may not criticize or reflect upon the character, conduct or motive of any other officer. Reserve officers within the promotion zones should also make sure that all fitness reports and other required annual personnel reports are submitted in time to be included in their records when presented to the promotion board.

## Selective Service Will Screen Standby Reserve

Reservists who have been transferred into the Standby Reserve may expect to receive periodical requests from the Selective Service System for information on any changes developed since they were screened into the Standby Reserve - changes such as employment, or dependency status which might affect their retention in the Standby Reserve.

While military control maintains the basic records, and similar responsibilities will continue to be the function of the Coast Guard, under a recently published Department of Defense Directive, the Selective Service System is responsible for determining the availability

of members of the Standby Reserve for involuntary order to active duty in time of war or national emergency declared by the Congress.

To achieve this end it is imperative that changes in address and Reserve promptly acknowledge and comply with all communications received from the Selective Service System. Changes in address and similar information will continue to be reported to the appropriate District Commander for members in category USCGR-S (active status) or category USCGR-I (inactive status),
