Composition & Rhetoric (ENGL 101) [EN024B]

3.00

(Through the critical engagement of a variety of texts, including written, oral, and visual, this course prepares students to become careful readers, critical thinkers, and skilled writers. Drawing upon rhetorical theory, it emphasizes the practices of analytical reading, informed reasoning, effective writing, and sound argumentation. The course requires 4,000 words of writing in no fewer than five writing projects. College credit by examination may apply. The CLEP General English with essay -scores above 480 for the older version and above 50 for the newer version may be accepted.)

Composition & Literature (ENGL 102) [EN025B]

3.00

(Continues the emphasis on writing. Two analytical papers, based upon studies of the short story, poetry, and drama, and a research paper, sequentially developed, are required. Prerequisite: ENGL 101.)

Speech Communication (COMS 101) [CM99SB]

3.00

(Study and practice in communicating ideas competently in public speaking. Students are also given a foundation for development of communication skills in other human communication contexts, including dyadic and small group communication. Prerequisite: ENGL 100 or advanced standing on the English placement test. College credit for military training may apply.)

Intermediate Algebra (MATH 110)

3.00

(Review of exponents, polynomials, factoring, roots and radicals, graphing, rational expressions, equations and inequalities, systems of linear equations and problem solving. This course may not be used to meet the General Education requirement. (Developmental Math is a component of the Bruckner Learning Center.) Prerequisite: MATH 100)

Introduction to Probability and Statistics (MATH 201)

3.00

(Introduction to descriptive statistics and probability, probability distributions, estimation, tests of hypotheses, chi-square tests, regression analysis, and correlation with applications in business and science. Prerequisite: MATH 110 or the equivalent)

(Visit the LU website for a description of this course.)	
Introduction to Christian Thought (THEO 104)	3.00
(Visit the LU website for a description of this course.)	
Contemporary World Views (PHIL 104) [PL36SB]	3.00
(A survey of the major positions and figures in philosophy and the cultural worldviews and practical applications that derive from them, focusing specifically on theism, naturalism and humanism in contemporary thought.)	
Principles of Accounting I (ACCT 211) [AC021B]	4.00
(A study of basic transactions, general ledger accounts, books of original entry, closing and adjusting entry processes, trial balances, financial statements, accounting for assets, liabilities, sole Proprietorship, equity, revenues, and expenses.) {DANTES Code = 03.01.00}	
Principles of Accounting II (ACCT 212) [AC025B]	4.00
(A study of the fundamentals of Accounting with a financial accounting emphasis on the corporate form of business including such topics as bonds, capital stock, retained earnings, statement of cash flows and financial statement analysis; and a managerial accounting perspective including topics related to global business, cost accounting measurement systems, cost-volume-profit analysis, managerial decision making concepts, operational budgeting, standard cost systems and capital budgeting.) {DANTES Code = 03.01.09 or 03.01.00}	

Business Law (BUSI 301) [BU062B]	3.00
(Designed to increase the understanding of those legal principles which apply to normal business transactions. Contracts, labor-management responsibilities, property, insurance partnerships, corporations, wills and trusts, torts and business crimes are among the topics discussed.) {DANTES Code = 12.01.00}	
Principles of Management (BUSI 310) [MG001B]	3.00
(Management requires a balance between social (people) and technical (quantitative) perspectives, as well as between efficiency and effectiveness. This course emphasizes the application of these perspectives in each of the planning, organizing, leading and controlling functions.) {DANTES Code = 03.10.00}	
Corporate Finance (BUSI 320) [BU003B]	3.00
(A study of the financial forms of business organization, with special attention to the corporation and its advantages and disadvantages; capital stocks and bonds; budgeting; dividend policy; failure and reorganization; financial accounting; and cash flows.) {DANTES Code = 03.02.01}	
Marketing (BUSI 330)	3.00
(The study of the system of activities that constitute marketing with emphasis on the principles, policies and strategies utilized to identify and satisfy the needs and wants of consumers. The universal application of marketing in all forms of organizations is stressed.) {DANTES Code = 03.11.00}	
Advanced Object-Oriented Programming (CMIS 312)	3.00
(Visit the LU website for a description of this course.)	
Business Application Programming I (CMIS 211)	3.00
(Development of computer and programming skills, problem solving methods, and selected applications. It's a broad-based introduction to programming. Students will learn how to build the program from the design phase all the way through to delivery. Students will have a firm foundation for designing and building their programs, from the ground up.)	
Business Application Programming II (CMIS 212)	3.00
(A study of the general-purpose, secure, object-oriented, portable programs. This course prepares students to program stand-alone applications and applications for the World Wide Web. It will cover features such as programming concepts, data types, operators, flow control statements, objects, classes, methods, arrays, strings, and applets. The concept of object-oriented programming is emphasized.)	
Web Architecture & Development (CMIS 310)	3.00
(Provides students with thorough knowledge of the foundations of e-commerce, current technologies utilized in the development of an e-commerce web site, and criteria for assessing the usability of e-commerce sites.)	

IS Hardware and Software (CMIS 320)	3.00
(Emphasis is placed on the role of the computer in information processing, including the design of computer hardware and operating systems, application programming, data storage, network and client/server concepts, and systems development life cycle.)	
Business Data Communication Systems (CMIS 330)	3.00
(A study of the architecture, concepts, terminology, design, and management issues related to the modern environment of networking and data communications. Various types of networks and communication systems, protocols, regulatory issues and policies will be explored.)	
System Analysis and Design (CMIS 351)	3.00
(This practical course in information systems development will cover the concepts, skills, methodologies (RAD as well as SDLC), and tools essential for systems analysts to successfully develop information systems. The course will also introduce the student to the Oracle Designer CASE tools, which will be used to assist in the documentation of the analysis and design phases. The course will include a significant amount of team-based activities, therefore issues associated with team interactions and processes will be discussed.)

Database Management Systems (CMIS 450)	3.00
(The study of database management systems, database architecture, design, queries, applications, administration and implementation. The course will focus on data normalization, SQL (queries), and the use of relational database technology for building business applications. Projects will be assigned to provide hands-on experience with the SQL language and relational database software packages (Oracle and SQL Server 2000). (Formerly BUSI 450)	
IS Project Management (CMIS 460)	3.00
(Capstone course for MIS majors. Develops skills in managing the project development cycle in an organization. Topics include systems engineering, cost analysis, risk management, and managing the socio-technological elements of a project.)	
Management Information Systems Elective	3.00
(This course must be a 300/400 level CMIS course. Visit the LU website for a complete listing and description of courses.)	
Computer Concepts and Applications (INFT 110)	3.00
(This course will introduce the student to the operation and use of computers. Specific applications taught include operating systems, word processing, spreadsheets, and presentation software. In addition, students will learn basic terminology and concepts related to the use of computers in today's society.)
