COMMANDANT INSTRUCTION 3128.1G

Subj: Foreign Port Calls

Ref: (a) Coast Guard Regulations (COMDTINST M5000.3)

1. PURPOSE. This instruction provides policy on visits to foreign countries by U.S. Coast Guard vessels and prescribes procedures for obtaining clearance or making notification of foreign port calls.
2. DIRECTIVES AFFECTED. Commandant Instruction 3128.1F is canceled.
3. DISCUSSION.
  - a. Visits to foreign ports by U.S. Coast Guard vessels are conducted to support U.S. interests and policies abroad; foster goodwill by participation in civic action projects, cultural events, and professional exchanges with foreign counterpart organizations; obtain logistic support; effect ship maintenance and repairs; and enhance crew morale by providing the opportunity for liberty and recreation. Vessels and their crews represent the United States government. Vessel appearance and conduct of the crew in foreign ports must be exemplary at all times.
  - b. Each entry of a U.S. Coast Guard vessel into a foreign port or anchorage requires the permission (clearance) of the host government, except where emergency or stress of weather dictates force majeure or where existing agreements provide access to ports upon advance notification to the host government. Procedures for obtaining clearance or making notifications are provided in enclosure (1).

  - c. Area commanders are delegated responsibility and authority to administer foreign port visits to the countries listed in enclosure (2). This authority may be further delegated to operational commanders at the discretion of the area commander. Commandant approval is required for port visits to all other countries.
  - d. Operational commanders may seek local arrangements to simplify clearance procedures through U.S. defense attaches or diplomatic missions. Such local arrangements must be submitted to the chief of the U.S. diplomatic mission for consideration and concurrence. Commandant (G-CPI) and cognizant area commander shall be notified of all such local arrangements.
4. ACTION.
  - a. Commandant (G-CPI) will communicate directly with the Department of State and chiefs of U.S. diplomatic missions on matters of general policy and the status of diplomatic arrangements, and with appropriate clearance agencies to initiate requests for diplomatic clearances for foreign port calls to countries not listed in enclosure (2).
  - b. Area commanders or their designated subordinates will communicate directly with the appropriate clearance agencies to provide notification, information, or initiate requests for diplomatic clearance for foreign port calls to countries listed in enclosure (2).
  - c. Unit commanding officers shall ensure that the provisions of the instruction are followed in planning, requesting and executing port visits to foreign countries.
5. CHANGES. Corrections or recommendations for improving this instruction shall be submitted to the Commandant (G-CPI).

## PORT VISITS BY U.S. COAST GUARD VESSELS TO FOREIGN COUNTRIES

1. Scope. This enclosure applies to all U.S. Coast Guard vessels except those under the operational control of the U.S. Navy at the time of a proposed visit who will comply with applicable Navy directives and orders in lieu of this Instruction.
2. Types of Visits. Ship visits are classified as formal (visit of courtesy), informal, or routine (operational).
  - a. Formal Visits. Formal visits of courtesy are normally made upon invitation to special occasions such as national or international celebrations or visits of chiefs of state.
  - b. Informal Visits. Informal visits are made primarily in the interest of familiarization and goodwill and require no special formalities other than courtesy calls prescribed by U.S. Coast Guard Regulations. Informal visits may, and usually do, include the objectives of routine visits. An exchange of social courtesies with local military and civilian officials is usually associated with an informal visit.
  - c. Routine (Operational). Routine visits are those made primarily for logistic support, maintenance, repairs, liberty and recreation, or in connection with operational missions. No protocol is required other than that dictated by local practice.
3. Preparation for Visits. In scheduling visits to foreign ports, the following must be taken into consideration:
  - a. A foreign port visit offers a unique opportunity to foster goodwill and facilitate cooperation with the host government in areas of mutual concern such as maritime search and rescue, marine safety, pollution prevention and drug interdiction. Port calls which are possible without adversely affecting normal operations are encouraged. However, frequent use of particular ports may result in lessening the spirit of welcome and cooperation.
  - b. Mid-week visits are often more acceptable than weekends, when local activities are closed. Arrivals and departures should be scheduled on weekdays and during normal working hours whenever possible.
  - c. The frequency of visits and sizes of liberty parties should be in consonance with available port and recreational/liberty facilities.
  - d. Visits should not be scheduled during periods of elections, religious holidays, or when political developments indicate that ship visits are not desirable.
  - e. Since a visit to a foreign port requires approval by the host nation, it is essential that the visit be handled expeditiously and correctly. Consideration must be shown not only for the host but also the U.S.

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3. e. (con't) diplomatic officials who arrange the visit. Visit approvals are often handled at such high levels within the host government that oversights or inconsiderate actions could cause embarrassment to the U.S. government.
4. Clearance Requirements and Procedures.
  - a. Each entry of a Coast Guard vessel into a foreign port or anchorage requires the permission (clearance) of the host government, except where emergency or stress of weather dictates force majeure or where existing agreements provide access to ports upon advance notification to the host government. Countries for which notification procedures are in effect are indicated in the "Arrangement Required" column of enclosure (2).
  - b. Vessel requests for foreign port visits shall be submitted via the operational chain of command to the cognizant area commander or his designated subordinate. Commandant (G-CPI) and the Coast Guard Intelligence Coordination Center shall be information addresses on all port visit requests. Non-Coast Guard addresses shall not be included on the vessel's initial request. For approved visits to countries listed in enclosure (2), the area commander or his designated subordinate will initiate requests for diplomatic clearance or provide notifications to the appropriate clearance agencies indicated in enclosure (2). For a visit to any other country, the area commander shall notify Commandant (G-CPI) by message of his conceptual approval of the visit and Commandant (G-CPI) will initiate the request for diplomatic clearance.
  - c. Except as noted in enclosure (2), or modified by local arrangements, clearance requests or notifications must be initiated in time to assure receipt by the clearance activity or agency at least thirty (30) days in advance of the visit. Adequate time for processing by area commanders or Commandant must be considered and is not included in the 30 day requirement.
  - d. Vessel requests for foreign port visits and subsequent diplomatic clearance requests or notifications should include the following information:
    - (1) Name of port and country to be visited.
    - (2) Type of visit and purpose (see paragraph 2).
    - (3) Name of vessel(s) including type (WHEC, WMEC, etc.) and hull number. If appropriate, indicate whether saluting or non-saluting.
    - (4) Dates and times (local country time) of arrival and departure.
    - (5) Name of commanding officer, rank, and date of rank.

4. d. (6) Total number of officers, enlisted personnel, and civilians embarked, and the maximum daily liberty party. Commanding officers shall ensure that civilians have all necessary passports and visas and shall so state (it is the responsibility of the civilians to obtain passports and the necessary visas).
  - (7) Major logistic requirements, including type and quantity if appropriate (food, fuel, water, electricity, garbage removal, telephone, pilot, pier space, etc.).
  - (8) Specific information on frequencies to be used within foreign territorial waters so that transmission authority can be obtained to preclude inadvertent disruption of host country communications. This information must include: (a) frequency, (b) emission, (c) designator, (d) type of emission and (e) power (e.g., 13144.6 KHZ, 2K8J3E, SSBSC TELEPHONY, 1000 W). Note: Extractions from M2400.1 (Frequency Plan) are not classified. If classified frequencies are to be used while in a foreign port, then ship's initial request message must be classified and contain all the required frequency information.
  - (9) Information on aircraft embarked and need for local flights if desired.
  - (10) The length, beam, and anticipated draft of vessel(s) at time of visit. Include the metric equivalent.
  - (11) Name and title of flag officers or distinguished passengers (e.g., anyone senior to CO) on board.
  - (12) Other pertinent information such as willingness to hold open house, provide professional presentations/discussions, extend courtesies to local officials, and participate in community action projects and/or athletic contests while in port.
- e. U.S. government policy of neither confirming nor denying the presence or absence of nuclear weapons on board U.S. military ships or aircraft applies to Coast Guard vessels and aircraft. U.S. clearance activities and agencies will comply with this policy when arranging clearance or making notification with the host government.
  - f. Once diplomatic clearance has been requested or notification of a foreign port visit has been made, every reasonable effort should be made to comply with the visit schedule as requested. If a minor change in schedule or cancellation of the port visit is necessary prior to receipt of diplomatic clearance, the vessel shall notify the cognizant area commander, his designated subordinate, or Commandant, as appropriate, who will notify the clearance activity or agency of the change or cancellation. Once diplomatic clearance has been granted by the country or notification of a foreign port visit has been made, however, the responsibility for follow-up or amendment shifts to the vessel. All addressees on prior message traffic will be included on the change request.

CLEARANCE PROCEDURES BY COUNTRY

1. This enclosure identifies the activity or agency responsible for arranging clearance or making notification of visits to foreign ports and will be used by the cognizant area commander or his designated subordinate to initiate requests for diplomatic clearance or provide notification of U.S. Coast Guard ship visits.
2. Commandant (G-CPI) and the Coast Guard Intelligence Coordination will be information addressees on any message relating to U.S. Coast Guard ship visits to foreign ports.
3. Commandant (G-CPI) will initiate requests for diplomatic clearance for ship visits to any country not listed in this enclosure after receipt of conceptual approval of the visit from the cognizant area commander.
4. Area commanders will monitor clearance requests for visits to ports in the area of their cognizance to ensure that ports are not overvisited and that the host government, as well as U.S. diplomatic officials, are not overburdened.
5. Visits requiring clearance by the host government shall not be made public until such clearance has been granted.
