## COAST GUARD HISTORY

### Cutter Hudson Medal Winners



The Spanish-American War of 1898 was a brief engagement. In the Battle of Cardenas Bay, Revenue Cutter *Hudson* and naval torpedo boat USS *Winslow* attacked a group of Spanish gunboats in Cardenas harbor. Spanish shore batteries and enemy gunboats opened fire on *Winslow*, killing many on board. *Hudson's* gun crews, including African-Americans Moses Jones and Henry Savage, kept up a steady close-range covering fire of 135 rounds in twenty minutes as the cutter moved in to rescue the weakened *Winslow* and its crew. A month after the naval action at Cardenas, *Hudson's* captain wrote the Treasury Department: "Each and every member of the crew ... did his whole duty cheerfully and without the least hesitation." On special recommendation of President McKinley, Congress honored *Hudson's* crew with specially minted medals for bravery. Savage and Jones were the first African-Americans to receive such recognition for action against an enemy on the high seas.

# WHAT IS EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY?

The Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, together with commensurate staffs within federal agencies, work to enforce the following: Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Equal Pay Act (EPA) of 1963, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act (ADEA) of 1967, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (Sections 501 and 505), Titles I and V of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADEA) of 1990, and the Civil Rights Act of 1991. They also assure agency compliance with resulting policies and regulations. The foregoing codify protections for individuals against employment discrimination on the bases of race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, disability and reprisal for prior EEO activity. EEO laws apply to employers with 15 or more employees including state and local governments, employment agencies, labor organizations, and the federal government.

In accordance with EEOC regulations, individuals wishing to raise discrimination claims based on the statutorily protected factors (above) must first address their concerns to an Equal Opportunity (EO) counselor. Coast Guard EO counselors receive training in conducting limited inquiries into, and attempting to resolve discrimination claims. Should complaints prove irresolvable, counselors notify aggrieved parties of their rights in filing a formal complaint. The Office of Civil Rights updates and posts Coast Guard complaint data quarterly.
