Coast Guard History

Merle J. Smith, Jr.: Academic, Athlete and African American Pioneer of Service Diversity



In 1966, Merle J. Smith became the first African American to graduate from the

Coast Guard Academy. As a cadet, he played on the Academy's 1963 Tangerine Bowl team under the famous coach Otto Graham. As CO of an 82-foot cutter in Vietnam, Smith became the first African American Coastguardsman to command a cutter in combat. In addition, he was also the second African American to receive the Bronze Star Medal. In later years, he earned his law degree at Georgetown University and returned to the Coast Guard Academy to teach courses. *Source: William H. Thiesen, USCG Atlantic Area Historian*



USCG DEOCS Usage Sets New Record for 2010

Since 2003, both Coast Guard units and members have participated in the Defense Equal Opportunity Management Institute's (DEOMI) Organization Climate Survey (DEOCS).

DEOCS is designed to assist Commanders, Commanding Officers, and Officers-in-Charge with proactively assessing Civil Rights climate organizational effectiveness, and behaviors that can impact the organization's overall mission. For 2010, Coast Guard set a new record as to the number of units and members participating in DEOCS. Units



participating in DEOCS totaled 329, a 93.5% increase from FY-2009; and CG members participating in DEOCS totaled 21,061, a 74.7% increase from FY-2009. This represents a significant improvement.
