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

money abroad, blow your money on blackjack or even flee the country with a pocket full of diamonds; it's Treasury's FINCEN that follows the money to make sure crime doesn't pay for terrorist financiers, organized crime, narcotics traffickers, Ponzi scheme operators and loan modification scammers." Director James Freis will highlight his bureau's work in safeguarding the financial system, both here and abroad.



Before his appointment as Director of FinCEN, Mr. Freis served in the Treasury Department as Deputy Assistant General Counsel for Enforcement and Intelligence, providing legal support to the Office of Terrorism and Financial Intelligence, FinCEN, and the Office of Foreign Assets Control. Previously, Mr. Freis served as Senior Counsel in the Legal Service of the Bank for International Settlements (BIS) in Basel, Switzerland, advising on the investment of monetary reserves and interacting with the international financial standard setters; as well as in the Federal Reserve Bank of New York's (FRBNY's) legal department, where he advised on payment and settlement systems. Mr. Freis earned his Juris Doctorate from Harvard Law School and his bachelor's degree from Georgetown University, graduating with honors from each institution. He is an attorney-at-law and a Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) charterholder. He is a member of the American Bar Association as well as the Committee on International Monetary Law of the International Law Association. He is the recipient of the Treasury Secretary's Honor Award, received recognition for outstanding service to the BIS, was the recipient of the FRBNY President's Awards for Excellence, and in 2009 received the Cressey Award from the Association of Certified Fraud Examiners for achievement in the detection and deterrence of fraud.



<p>June 26, 2012 1PM-3PM, ET</p>	<p>Black Patriots and Loyalists: Fighting for Emancipation in the War for Independence</p> <p>--Alan Gilbert</p> <p>Professor Emeritus Hilary Putnam of Harvard University raves, “Most of us think we know the story of the American Revolution, but after reading Alan Gilbert’s amazing book I realize that what most of us know is less than half of the story.” We commonly think of the American Revolution as simply the war for independence from British colonial rule. But, of course, that independence actually applied to only a portion of the American population--African Americans would still be bound in slavery for nearly another century. In <u>Black Patriots and Loyalists</u>, Alan Gilbert asks us to rethink what we know about the Revolutionary War, to realize that while white Americans were fighting for their freedom, black Americans were joining the British imperial forces to gain theirs. From 2005 to early 2007, he served as deputy assistant secretary for intelligence and analysis at the U.S. Department of the Treasury. During his tenure at Treasury, Dr. Levitt played a central role in efforts to protect the U.S. financial system from abuse and to deny terrorists, weapons proliferators, and other rogue actors the ability to finance threats to U.S. national security. In 2008-2009, he served as a State Department counterterrorism advisor to the special envoy for Middle East regional security (SEMERS), General James L. Jones. <p>July 18, 2012 1pm-3pm</p> 	 <p>Ethical Chic: The Inside Story of the Companies We Think We Love—Fran Hawthorne</p> <p>TEI favorite Fran Hawthorne takes her investigative-journalism skills--honed from more than two decades as a business journalist—to analyze leadership succession at six favorite companies: Apple, Starbucks, Trader Joe's, American Apparel, Timberland, and Tom's of Maine. At their height, five of these companies were run by their founders or a descendant of the founding family. How well did these founders prepare their companies for leadership succession? Once these founders leave, how can a nonfounder-CEO or a new owner maintain the company's beloved image among both employees and customers? Another leadership issue highlighted will be "benevolent paternalism" vs. unionization.
