**Federal and State Government (POLS 2301)** 3.00

(Survey course covering such topics as the national state constitutions, institutional structures and processes, political parties, elections, civil liberties and civil rights. College credit by examination may apply.)

**Computer Applications (COSC 2311)** 3.00

(Students with computer competency will learn to enhance their personal productivity and problem solving skills using knowledge work tools (spreadsheets, presentation graphics, word processing, Internet and electronic mail))expected of end users. Students will improve their skills as knowledge workers through effective and efficient use of integrated software. Information technologies will be applied to problem situations by design and use of small information systems for individuals and groups. Students who possess the requisite skills may opt to take challenge examination administered by the School of Business. If a satisfactory score is received on the exam, the student may substitute an elective in place of the COSC 2311 requirement in the degree plan. Cost for the exam is \$20. This is not an advanced placement test and no academic credit will be awarded. Students who want credit for the course may take a different exam, pay 1/3 tuition, and score a B or better. Students who fail to pass the exam or choose not to attempt the exam must enroll in and pass COSC 2311. Prerequisite: Documented computer competency; transcribed course.)

**Orientation (ORIE 0001, UNIV 1100)**

(A degree requirement for all students during the initial term of enrollment at Wayland.)

**Exit Seminar (GRAD 0001, 4101)** 1.00

(GRAD 4101 - This 15-clock-hour seminar is required of all students seeking a degree from one of the University's external campuses. It is to be completed during the final semester prior to graduation and includes all post-testing required for the degree. Students completing the course will receive one semester hour of elective credit.)

**Old Testament History (RLGN 1301) 3.00**

(An introductory survey of the historical literature with special attention to the institutions, religion, and national life of the Hebrew people. Wayland Baptist University will not accept RLGN 1301, Old Testament History, or RLGN 1302, New Testament History, or their equivalents, from any institution except other Baptist universities. In no case will either of these two courses be accepted if they were taken by correspondence. The School of Religion & Philosophy must approve any exception to this policy.)

**New Testament History (RLGN 1302) 3.00**

(An introductory survey of the historical literature with special attention to the background and origins of Christian beliefs and practices, and to the life of Jesus Christ and the early Christian community. Wayland Baptist University will not accept RLGN 1301, Old Testament History, or RLGN 1302, New Testament History, or their equivalents, from any institution except other Baptist universities. In no case will either of these two courses be accepted if they were taken by correspondence. The School of Religion & Philosophy must approve any exception to this policy.)

**Business Administration Major Requirements**

Students majoring in Business Administration must complete 36 semester hours of which 18 must be upper-division credit. The 36-semester hour major includes an 18-semester hour core and an 18-semester hour specialization.

**Business Ethics (BUAD 4334) 3.00**

(Offers an in-depth investigation of the characteristics of ethical and effective management, including an assessment of leadership styles within the context of a Christian value system. Ethical reasoning is developed and applied to a variety of business situations.)

Students will learn to read and understand research reports, to analyze and interpret results, and to develop in-depth, research-based papers centering on topics in their academic disciplines. Prerequisite ENGL 1301)

**Health Care Specialization courses****Administration & Organization of Health Facilities (HLAD 3335) 3.00**

(The management process of planning, organization, leading, and controlling health institutions: utilization of marketing techniques, organizational structures, roles of the governing board, chief executive officer, physician, other professional and technical personnel, and the patient. Regulatory aspects, licensing, certifying, and accrediting.)

**Health Care Delivery Systems (HLAD 4334) 3.00**

(Conceptual dimensions and elements of the health care delivery ecosystem and important patterns of behavior and organization. Prerequisite: HLAD 3335.)

**Information Systems Theory & Practice (MISM 3303) 3.00**

(This course provides an understanding of organizational systems, planning, and decision process, and how information is used for decision support in organizations. It covers quality and decision theory, information theory, and practice essential for providing viable information to the organization. It outlines the concepts of IS for competitive advantage, data as a resource, IS and IT planning, re-engineering, project management and development of systems, and end-user computing. Prerequisites: COSC 2311.)

Because this is a degree from a SOC affiliated college, the academic residency requirements are limited, thereby allowing students to transfer in a significant portion of the degree, as mentioned above. #### Wayland Baptist University: General Information

Wayland Baptist University is the oldest institution of higher education on the High Plains of West Texas. As a private, coeducational Baptist university, Wayland exists to educate students in an academically challenging and distinctively Christian environment for professional success, lifelong learning and service to God and

humankind.

The University seeks to educate its students by developing them intellectually, physically, spiritually, and socially, preparing them to move into a variety of professions or into further study. Wayland offers a strong liberal arts education in a traditional setting and provides degree programs that serve the needs of an older, highly mobile, employed population. Through the main campus in Plainview and multiple campuses, both domestic and international, Wayland offers associate, baccalaureate, and masters' degrees.

The Virtual Campus has been developed to supplement the course offerings available at each of their 13 Wayland campuses. Wayland does not offer an undergraduate online degree in any area, but they do help students obtain their educational goals by making courses more accessible.

The Virtual Campus consists of classes that are available via the Internet to students who are currently enrolled at any Wayland Baptist University Campus. In a Virtual Campus course, the class web site becomes your classroom. Assignments, notes, slide presentations, ancillary material, and Internet resources are made available to you via the Internet. Interaction between the instructor and the student or among students can be accomplished in a variety of ways. You can interact with your instructor or classmates via e-mail, bulletin boards (not in real-time), and sometimes chat rooms (real-time).

The tuition cost is \$185.00 per credit hour for undergraduate. Online courses are \$265.00 per credit hour for undergraduate.
