Hamilton Christening celebrates union between Ingalls and Coast Guard

The christening of National Security Cutter *Hamilton* (WMSL 753) Saturday, Oct. 26, was a celebration of the strong ties that connect the United States Coast Guard and Ingalls Shipbuilding.

Adm. Robert J. Papp Jr., Commandant of the Coast Guard, likened the ceremony to a marriage between industry and the uniformed service.

"It's the Coast Guard family coming together with the Ingalls Family for a great adventure and a great providence. It's a marriage built out of business, but it is definitely a partnership, and we appreciate our partnership with Ingalls," Papp, the ceremony's keynote speaker, said moments before his wife and ship's sponsor Linda Kapral Papp christened the ship.

More than 1,000 guests attended the ceremony to watch as Mrs. Papp broke the bottle of sparkling wine across the bow of *Hamilton*, transforming the vessel from a simple hull number to a named ship.

Before taking her place on the christening platform at the bow of *Hamilton*, Mrs. Papp thanked the shipbuilders who worked so diligently to build the nation's fourth National Security Cutter.

"I want to thank Ingalls Shipbuilding and, in particular, all of the outstanding men and women who worked so hard here in the yard to build such a tremendous cutter," Mrs. Papp said. "I have absolutely no doubt that *Hamilton* will be the most capable and technologically advanced cutter in the Coast Guard's long history."

Ingalls 75-year legacy of pride in workmanship continues, according to Ingalls Shipbuilding President **Irwin F. Edenzon**, who recognized shipbuilders **Luke Hyzny**, carpenter workleaderman; **Chequia Lett**, paint foreman; and **Donald McCullum**, welder workleaderman, for their outstanding work on *Hamilton*.

"Not only do our shipbuilders know that the ships we build have to be affordable, they know who serves in them: Coast Guard men and women, Sailors and Marines who are our friends, our neighbors, our sons, daughters, nieces and nephews—America's heroes," Edenzon said.

- Oct. 29, 1959 – USS *Parsons* (DD- 949), the second *Forest Sherman* Class destroyer built at Ingalls, was commissioned at Charleston Naval Shipyard in South Carolina.
- Oct. 30, 1978 – The destroyer USS *Moosbrugger* (DD-18) set sail for acceptance trials after a successful Oct. 18 builder’s trial.
- Oct. 18, 1997 – Avondale launched USNS *Fisher* (T-AKR 301), the second of seven 950-foot Strategic Sealift ships built for the U.S. Navy.
- Nov. 10, 1999 – The U.S. Coast Guard Polar Icebreaker *Healy* (WAGB 20) was delivered by Avondale. The 420-foot-long ship was the last to be side-launched at Avondale and is still serving the USCG in the Arctic region.

Coin box sealed in Hamilton’s mast

U.S. Coast Guard Chief Warrant Officer Jerry “J.P.” Michaud, main propulsion assistant and crew member of the fourth National Security Cutter *Hamilton* (WMSL 753), displays the mast stepping coin box before it is permanently sealed in the ship’s mast by 25-year Ingalls welder Ronald “Egg Man” Jones Oct. 28. Also present for the brief ceremony were U.S. Coast Guard Capt. Douglas Fears, *Hamilton*’s prospective commanding officer; Jim French, director of Ingalls U.S. Coast Guard Programs; and other representatives of the USCG Project Residence Office and Ingalls program office. Mast stepping is a tradition dating back to ancient Greeks who placed coins beneath the mast to pay passage to the afterlife. The United States adopted the tradition and has continued stepping the mast for good luck since the 1797 construction of the U.S.S. *Constitution*. The contents of *Hamilton*’s coin box were displayed at the sponsor’s dinner Friday, Oct. 25. The box contained dollar coins, half dollars and pennies totaling the ship’s hull number, along with other mementos including a \$10 bill signed by the seventh, eighth and ninth generation direct descendents of first U.S. Secretary of State Alexander Hamilton: Douglas Sinclair Hamilton, his son Alexander Douglas Hamilton and his grandson, Alexander Grant Hamilton.



Shipbuilders Clean Up

Saturday, Oct. 19 was a busy day along Lake Pontchartrain and waterways across the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

Despite rainy weather and multiple events occurring across the Coast, shipbuilders at Ingalls' Avondale, Gulfport and Pascagoula facilities took part in the annual Lake Pontchartrain Basin Foundation's Beach Sweep and Mississippi Coastal Cleanup.

Dozens of shipbuilders turned out with gloves, trash grabbers and bags to clean up litter from beaches and waterways.

Environmental Health and Safety department personnel assisted with the various sites including Pascagoula River Park, Pascagoula Causeway, Harrison County's Three Rivers Park and Louisiana's Bayou St. John area near Lake Pontchartrain.

Mark Ross, Environmental Engineering manager, coordinated the Pascagoula River Park crew. Although the rain discouraged the usual drove of volunteers, several shipbuilders and community members braved the elements to pick up their park.

"We have this wonderful tract of land near our facility provided by the city of Pascagoula," said Ross. "As good neighbors, Ingalls Shipbuilding employees want to do our part to keep this area nice for all visitors."

The 23 volunteers at Pascagoula River Park and Causeway removed 27 bags of trash from the beaches. Throughout The Mississippi Gulf Coast 1,277 volunteers picked up more than 7.7 tons of trash and recyclables along 99 miles of coastal waterways in three counties.

Avondale Environmental Engineering manager **Tuyen Nguyen** led the team at Bayou St. John.

"It's important for our shipbuilders to be good stewards of the environment," said

Nguyen. "We depend on these waterways for food and recreation. Not everyone considers the impact of a little trash from each visitor, but our team got a first-hand look at why cleanup is important."

Nguyen said her group collected about eight large bags of trash containing 150 pounds of litter, everything from bottles and cans, to automobile bumper parts and pieces of scrap steel, to candy wrappers and cigarette butts.

Safety Moment

Here are a few safety tips for shipbuilders from EH&S and Security:

- Observe the “no-drive-time” in the shipyard during shift changes to give pedestrians safe passage.
- Avondale’s no-drive-time is Monday-Friday from 2:30 - 2:40 p.m.
- Pascagoula’s no-drive-times are Monday-Friday from 5:30 - 5:45 a.m. and 2:30 - 2:45 p.m.
- Obey posted speed limits in and out of the shipyard.
- The posted speed limits are 15 mph in Pascagoula and 10 mph in Avondale.
- The speed limit on the docks and in parking lots is 5 mph.
- Park your vehicles with at least six feet of clearance away from the crane tracks.
- Never obstruct a roadway or fire hydrant with your vehicle.


