


Individual Medical Readiness (IMR) vs. Deployment Limiting Medical Conditions (DLMC)

Can I issue orders to a reservist?



1. **ADT Voluntary:** Initial Active Duty for Training (IADT), 10 U.S.C. §671; Annual Training (ADT-AT), 10 U.S.C. §10147; Other Training (ADT-OTD).
ADT Involuntary: ADT – Failure to Satisfactorily Perform, 10 U.S.C. §10148.
2. **ADOT Voluntary:** Active Duty for Operational Support (ADOS), 10 U.S.C. §12301(d) - ADOS-AC/RC, 10 U.S.C. §12301(d); Extended Active Duty (EAD), 10 U.S.C. §12301(d); Reserve Program Administrator (RPA), 10 U.S.C. §12310; Medical Care, 10 U.S.C. §12322.
ADOT Involuntary: Operational Contingency – Full mobilization, 10 U.S.C. §12301(a), Partial Mobilization, 10 U.S.C. §12302; Presidential Recall, 10 U.S.C. §12304; Domestic Response Response, 14 U.S.C. §712; Involuntary Active Duty, 10 U.S.C. §12301(b); Unsatisfactory Participation, 10 U.S.C. §12303.
3. If DLMC is pregnancy related, see Pregnancy in the Coast Guard, COMDTINST 1000.9 for specific guidelines.
4. Administrative review by medical of what DLMC is and whether member can perform orders (medically).
5. Medical appointments to be scheduled in advance.
6. Refer to 10 USC §101 (a)(13) for definition.
7. The pre-deployment screening process described in DoDI 6490.07 and 10 USC §1074a includes the Pre-Deployment Health Assessment, Mental Health Assessment, and screening for DLMC.
