Design & Service

A total of thirty-one Navy destroyers were lent to the Coast Guard for enforcing Prohibition. Adapting these vessels to service was thought to be less costly than building new ships. In the end the rehabilitation of the vessels became a saga in itself because of the exceedingly poor condition of many of these war-weary ships. In many instances it took nearly a year to bring the vessels up to seaworthiness. Additionally, these were by far the largest and most sophisticated vessels ever operated by the service and trained personnel were nearly nonexistent. As a result, Congress authorized hundreds of new enlistees. It was these inexperienced men that generally made up the destroyer crews.

USCGD *Jouett* was one of the pre-World War I 742-ton "flivvers". All were capable of over 25 knots, an advantage in the rum-chasing business. They, however, were easily outmaneuvered by smaller vessels. The destroyers' mission, therefore, was to picket the larger supply ships ("mother ships") and prevent them from off-loading their cargo onto the smaller, speedier contact boats that ran the liquor into shore. *Jouett* was stationed at New London, CT until transferred to Boston, MA in 1926.

Operational History

28 Apr 1924 Transferred from US Navy to Coast Guard at Philadelphia Navy Yard.

23 Aug 1924 Commissioned at Philadelphia Navy Yard.

29 Aug 1924 Arrived at permanent duty station at New London.

22 May 1926 Ordered to new duty station at Boston.

16 Jul 1926 Arrived at new duty Station, Boston.

14 Apr 1931 Left Boston for Philadelphia Navy Yard

16 Apr 1931 Arrived Philadelphia Navy Yard.

16 May 1931 Decommissioned and returned to US Navy.
