Writing About Non-Fiction or Intro to Literature Writing About Fiction [EN025A]

(Writing About Non-Fiction Prose ENC 1102 As a continuation of English Composition I, this course focuses on the study of non-fiction prose, to develop students proficiency in analyzing and evaluating texts and in planning, writing and documenting researched papers. This course covers CLAST writing competencies and serves to meet the Gordon Rule writing requirement - 6,000 words.

Introduction to Literature: Writing about Fiction LIT 2000 This course is designed to enhance personal appreciation of literature, hone critical thinking skills, and provide instruction in the MLA research paper. Introduction to Literature: Writing About Fiction presents the major literary forms, skills in reading and writing about literature, their distinctive characteristics and conventions, principal literary themes, and different critical approaches. This introductory course prepares students for further literary study. This course includes reading, speaking and writing competencies. Prerequisites ENC 1101 with a grade of "C" or better. {DANTES Code = 11.07.00}

**Introduction to Criminology (CCJ 1010) [CJ102A] 3.00**

(The course provides a survey of deviant behavior as related to the concept and definition of crime, the concept and purposes of the law, the measurement and causes of crimes and societal reactions to criminal behavior from historical through contemporary periods. Oral presentations by students are required.)

**Introduction to Criminal Justice (CCJ 1020) [CJ101A] 3.00**

(This introduction to the philosophical and historical backgrounds of law enforcement includes the study of the organization, purpose, functions and processes of law enforcement, private security operations, privatization of correctional institution and other agencies involved in the administration of criminal justice in the United States.)

**Man, Crime, and Society (CCJ 1030) [LW015A] 3.00**

(This course consists of a basic study of the nature and peculiarities of human behavior in direct relationship to crime and delinquency.)

(The first discipline related internship provides students with meaningful work experience in a chosen career field. The course is designed to allow students to learn on the job as part of their educational program of study.)

<b>Criminal Evidence and Procedure (CJL 1400) [LW002A]</b>	<b>3.00</b>
(This course consists of the study and examination of the criminal rules of evidence - kinds, degrees, admissibility, competence and weight - specifically as they affect the law enforcement officer in the processes of arrest, force, search, seizure, preservation, custody, testimony and courtroom procedures.)

<b>Ethics in Criminal Justice (CCJ 2488) [CJ02SA]</b>	<b>3.00</b>
(This course provides a survey of the various ethical systems, the recognition of moral issues, and the development of moral imagination. The course also focuses on the ethical issues and problems generally encountered in the criminal justice system.)

<b>Juvenile Delinquency (CCJ 2500) [CJ112A]</b>	<b>3.00</b>
(This course presents the major issues of crime causation, rehabilitation and juvenile delinquency participation among the lower, middle and upper social classes. The course also covers the process of handling juvenile delinquents from confrontation with authorities, to detention, to release and aftercare.)

<b>Introduction to Information Technology (CGS 1060 ) [CS19SA]</b>	<b>3.00</b>
(This course, intended for individuals with no previous computing experience, includes the history of computers, a survey of how computers are used today, the basic components of computers and computer terminology and laboratory experiences using application software. A study of information systems and computer careers completes the course. Additional lab time may be required in order to complete application assignments. Three contact hours: one laboratory hour.)	
<b>Introduction to Corrections (CJC 1000) [CJ401A]</b>	<b>3.00</b>
(With emphasis on career orientation, this course examines the total correctional process from law enforcement through the administration of justice, probation, prisons and correctional institutions, and parole.)

<b>Police Administration (CJE 1300) [CJ108A]</b>	<b>3.00</b>
(This course presents the principles of organization and administration in law enforcement including functions and activities, planning and research, public relations, personnel and training, inspection and control, records and communications and custody. <b>Criminal Law, Evidence and Procedure (CCJ 1400 )</b>	<b>3.00</b>
(This course consists of the study of the scope, purposes and principles of criminal law, the classification and analysis of crimes and criminal acts in general and the examination of selected specific offenses.)

Florida Community College at Jacksonville is one of the leading providers of distance learning to the military. Distance Learning (DL) is simply learning from a distance, usually from home, or from a conveniently located off-campus site. DL allows adults to earn college credits, even entire degrees, without ever leaving home. DL at Florida Community College at Jacksonville makes use of the Internet, software, modems, TV stations, 2-way television using fiber optics, and digital phone lines, satellites, videocassette and audio tape, and the ever-popular mailbox, to deliver instruction.

As technology continues to become more accessible and more affordable, distance learning changes and evolves. Learners now have the opportunity to take classes without the necessity to attend regular, weekly lectures on campus. Online courses from all academic departments are available via Internet access. #### POLICY NOTES:

Transfer credit accepted by FCCJ may include up to 45 semester hours of non-traditional credit (American Council on Education recommended credit and college level testing - CLEP, DSST, Excelsior and FCCJ's Proficiency Examination Program (PEP) tests). Also, 25% of the degree must be earned via FCCJ (including distance learning courses).

If the students enroll in an internship or cooperative education class and are seeking experience at a law enforcement agency or facility under Children and Family Services, then a background check is performed by the law enforcement agency or facility and the student may be denied employment (paid or non-paid) based on their criminal record.
